Including a Quorn Scouts Royal Artillery Bugle, Original Plans and Sections for Swithland Reservoir from 1889/90, A drawing of Buddon Brook/Quorn Memorial Gardens from the late 1980s and a newspaper article about the Quorn House Civil Defence Convalescent Home in World War Two.

Quorn's 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of D-Day – The variety of events really hit the mark with much appreciation expressed for the hard work and efforts of the village groups involved in making it happen. Often forgotten though is that history belongs to everyone, and this was demonstrated by the amount of research and effort that was put in by the people with the attention to detail which really brought our history to life. Whether looking at traditional flower displays or into the 1940's William IV pub, Arthur and Mabel's living room, visiting a cake and jam stall or sampling the food treat of the times 'Spam Fritters and Chips'. All these things sparked the memories and inspired. The St Bartholomew's Commemorative Church Service address and displays really brought home the life at the time linking the Normandy Invasion with the actual people of Quorn. Did you spot the rug on the floor of Lonsdale Mews Arthur and Mabel's Living Room? This was made in Quorn by a local resident during the war and typical of the time or the NQSC William IV bar beer tap handles with their F.A.Stenson 'Home Brewed Ale' labels? The WI Victory Sponge and other items made from wartime recipes as was the John Dory Spam Fritters and Chips. All helped us to commemorate the times past in respectful way.
